



Borthwick Water Valley Survey 2017

Summary of Results

7th May 2017

Survey Details

10 years ago, the Borthwick Water Community Development Trust carried out a survey of all valley residents to get their views and to help focus their efforts for the future. It was felt it would be beneficial to redo this exercise to help focus the CDT moving forward

In 2016, the Borthwick Water Community Development Trust, with the help of Heather Batsch (Manager of The Bridge (Community and Voluntary Sector Support Organisation)), got together with other valley organisations to brainstorm questions to include in the 2017 survey.

It was felt that the best response to a survey would be received if personal visits were made with the surveys, so in the second quarter of 2017, the Directors of the Borthwick Water Community Development Trust (the CDT) visited every home that falls under the remit of the CDT, handing out surveys for each member (aged 12 years or over) to complete.

Within a couple of weeks, the Directors returned to collect the completed surveys.

<u>Response</u>

195 surveys were distributed and 143 were returned, a response rate of 73.33%. 55% of the returns were from men, 42.6% from women, the rest choosing not to declare their gender.

73% of surveys were returned by residents aged 41 to 75, with the rest spread roughly equally across other age ranges.

90% were returned by people who were either Employed, Self-Employed or Retired (30%).

Note

The Survey Findings have been drawn impartially from the survey results in Appendix A. Please note, although there was a good survey return rate, the numbers involved are low (143 surveys returned). To ensure the survey findings are fair, the figures have been weighted to take into account, for example, that more men returned surveys than women, less 12 to 18 year olds completed surveys than other age groups etc etc...

The weighting mechanism when applied to the low number groups (such as 12 to 18 year olds) can skew their represented figures out of proportion, so some of the columns in the appendix may appear unusually high or low. Unfortunately, this is how it is, and should be viewed accordingly.

Survey Findings

Question 1 - Provision of Cycle Tracks / Footpaths in Craik Forest Ranked 7th most important overall

69% felt that this was at the very least "Quite Important" with 17% considering it of utmost importance.

Generally speaking, the voting went according to age, with the younger survey returners marking this topic as important. The importance, perhaps understandably, generally slackened as ages of returners increased. No difference according to gender.

Question 2 - Provide Marked Walks through the Valley

Ranked 10th most important overall

Slightly favoured by women more than men, but pretty much equally across all age ranges.

Question 3 - Develop a Forman Hall centred walk

Ranked 18th most important overall

46% felt it was not really important or of zero importance, but at least "very important" by 17%,

Question 4 - Create Dedicated and Informative Viewpoints

Ranked 15th most important overall

Particularly favoured by those aged 26 to 40 and by women more than men.

Question 5 - Benches for the Community

Ranked 14th most important overall

Significantly favoured more by women than men.

Question 6 - General Comments about the Borthwick Water Valley Environment

There was a general feeling that cycle tracks / footpaths are both good for Valley residents and tourists alike, with some concern for who would maintain them.

Generally positive comments about a Forman Hall centred walk.

Question 7 - Superfast Broadband

Ranked the most important overall.

If there was one issue valley residents felt was the most urgent for addressing it was bringing Superfast Broadband into the valley.

82.5% of surveys were filled in indicating that Superfast Broadband was of the Utmost Importance.

The support for Superfast Broadband seems to be across all age ranges and equally supported no matter whether the responder was employed, self-employed, retired or a student etc...

Question 8 - Establish Mobile Phone Signal throughout the Valley Ranked 2nd most important overall

Similar to the Superfast Broadband issue, this was supported across all ranges and job statuses with 74% feeling it was of the Utmost Importance.

Question 9 - Telephone / Broadband Comments

Overriding comments that Superfast Broadband is a must in this day and age and for the future, with some resigned to accepting any broadband as long as it works. Others couldn't see it happening.

Mobile Phone signals are seen as important too, but a lot of valley folk have become accustomed to not having a signal. A few felt it was important for emergency situations.

Question 10 - Improve Cross Group Communication between Valley Organisations Ranked 9th most important overall

Favoured more by women than men, with support equally spread across all age ranges and job statuses, 75% felt it was at least "Quite Important"

Question 11 - Pro-active "Welcome to the Valley" incl Welcome Pack Ranked 8th most important overall

73% felt that this was at least "Quite Important", women favouring a pro-active welcome slightly more than men. Support was pretty much equal across all age ranges apart from those aged 19 to 25.

Question 12 - Encourage Young People's Involvement in Valley Affairs

Ranked 3rd most important overall

Particularly favoured by students, but pretty much equally across all ranges, 92% felt that it was at the very least "Quite Important" with 38% feeling it was Very Important.

Question 13 - More Valley Information distributed by Facebook etc....

Ranked 12th most important overall

62% felt that this was at the most "Quite Important" with 38% feeling it was either not really important or of zero importance.

Question 14 - Improved efficiencies by consolidating valley organisations

Ranked 17th most important overall

80% felt that this was at the most "Quite Important" with 40% feeling it was not really important or of zero importance.

Question 15 - Investigate Organised Newspaper Deliveries

Ranked least important overall

Noone felt that was of the utmost importance. 70% felt that this was either not really important or of zero importance.

Question 16 - Valley-wide Community Bulb-Planting

Ranked 2nd least important overall

Favoured more by women than men, 50% felt this was either not really important or of zero importance.

Question 17 - "Getting Involved" Comments

Generally, people were in support of a friendly welcome into the valley, one feeling it could be done by neighbours.

Most of the comments were complimentary of the look of the valley when in bloom, with one comment warning that when out of bloom, flowers can be an eyesore. The comments were generally in favour of community bulb-planting.

Most of the people who commented on combining valley organisations felt that organisations were best kept separate "[to] flourish or die according to the interests of its organisers"

Question 18 - Investigate Community Power Schemes

Ranked 11th most important overall

Significantly more favoured by women than men, by those aged 19 to 25 and those who were "Employed"

66% felt that this was at the least "Quite Important"

Question 19 - Explore opportunities for affordable housing

Ranked 13th most important overall

Most important to the Unemployed, the importance factor declined as the age of respondents rose. Least important to the "Over 75's", most important to those aged "12 to 18" and "26 to 40"

Question 20 - Comments under "Community Business"

The majority of comments regarding Affordable Housing agreed that it is useful only if there are jobs to support the people living in "Affordable Housing" and that perhaps if it is something that should be tackled, then perhaps at the Hawick end of the valley.

As for Community Power schemes, there was a general feeling of "no more wind turbines", but favour for Hydro-power schemes with doubt whether there was enough of a head of water to make it viable

Question 21 - Importance of Forman Hall

Ranked 5th most important overall

A strong show of support for the Forman Hall, with 78% feeling it was at the least "Quite Important", women showing slightly more support than men. The support was generally equal across all age ranges and all job statuses apart from those who were unemployed.

Question 22 - Suggested Improvements to the Forman Hall

General approval of how valuable the Forman Hall is and lots of suggestions for additional things that could be done to encourage further use.

General consensus that it would be nice to see more people coming to valley events.

Question 23 - Suggested Events for the Forman Hall

Lots of wide-ranging suggestions received for new events at the Hall (see list in Appendix Q23) and requests for past activities (eg Bowling) to return.

Question 25 - Comments under Valley Amenities

Lots of praise for the Forman Hall Committee with approval for what they're doing.

A keeness to see more people attend valley events appears in this section too.

Question 26 - Formalise support for Resilient Communities

Ranked 4th most important overall

76% felt that this was at the least "Quite Important", favoured more by women than men. Support was across all age ranges and job statuses.

Question 27 - Develop Neighbourhood Watch Scheme

Ranked 6th most important overall

73% felt that this was at the least "Quite Important" with support across all ranges and job statuses.

Question 28 - Comments under Community Safety

General feeling that neighbours already notice unusual happenings in the valley and look after their neighbours with one feeling the valley was "too strung out" for a neighbourhood watch scheme"

Some support for First Aid training given distance from hospital, with an offer of training by 1 valley resident.

Question 29 - General Comments


Roads of particular concern to quite a few valley residents, both the state of them and the speed of logging lorries.

Broadband also received a number of comments on the lines of how important it is and the urgency with which it needs to be sorted.




Benches are important. Maybe have 1 or 2 on road from Roberton to Craik. Also Car sharing groups for walking. Also guided walks

Delivery of Superfast Broadband (>30Mbps) (not satellite)



Enjoyed the carpet bowling in the past, but someone needed to organise








Importance by Sex




Importance by Age Group









Importance by Sex

Make Roads better for Wood Extraction

I like it just the way it is. I feel the CDT is continually trying to justify its existence

Log wagons and timber extraction wrecking roads-should halt extraction until a sustainable solution is found. Mud etc- it's an offence to leave roads in this condition but they get away with it. Any other industry would have to have wheel washing as they leave the site to go on to public road.

Regular good repairs to the road.

Roads are dangerous especially for motorbikes. Gravel and mud in centre of road and passing places. Large no. of deep potholes. Log wagons causing majority of destruction to the road. This needs to be stopped until an alternative is found.

Roads are in serious disrepair. Some local farms are untidy. Fencing throughout valley is now poor.

Reducing speed of log lorries on the roads-60mph is not acceptable. Improve roads- fill in more potholes as they appear/are reported. Better signage between cattle grids to take care of sheep/lambs.

A different exit through the forest for the log lorries to get them OFF the valley roads. Flood the field at Woodburn Road end and turn it into a reservoir/lake for the wildlife. It floods anyway so why not make it more official-will also slow water flow into Hawick.

As newcomers to the valley the thing I would like is more opportunity to meet people to simply chat and get to know/history/etc. I fully support local power/broadband etc. on a community basis.

The Hawick and environs economy could benefit from more tourism related development. The valley could then benefit. Suggest linking with Scottish History (Historic Scotland?)& similar organisations to create wider interest in the area. Look to influence the Borders Nationa Park initiative towards including the valley in the boundary, up to St marys Loch. Liaise with D&G etc.
